

2022-23 School Overview

The Anderson Union High School District Alternative Education Program offers its students an opportunity to engage in educational programming alternative designed to provide the necessary credits to graduate with a high school diploma. North Valley High School provides educational opportunities for students aged 16+ years of age that have been previously unsuccessful within the typical, general education setting found at comprehensive high schools within the district. Students accessing education at the North Valley High School campus access educational environments with a higher staff to student environment allowing for greater individualized programming based on their specific credit needs. Dedicated faculty/staff use a variety of resources to enhance credit completion. Curriculum utilized at North Valley High School is board approved and follows California Common Core Standards. All students are able to access A-G approved and remedial coursework. All students have the opportunity to accelerate credit recovery, allowing for reintegration into comprehensive district programming, access early graduation, or allow for modified scheduling to access employment opportunities beyond the educational setting. The mission of North Valley High School is to provide every student the opportunity to develop the knowledge, skills, and character required to be successful, and responsible, members of our local community.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

The current North Valley High School campus was constructed in 1992. An additional building was added in October 2007. The campus consists of seven classrooms, and an office, contained in five modular buildings. All classrooms have internet access, and are part of a local area network that connects the campus with the District's comprehensive high schools, other alternative education sites, and the District Office. Although NVHS does not have a library, it does have the Internet and every classroom has a collection of books that students may check out.

Campus conditions are monitored by administration and faculty, as well as daily custodial staff. the campus is surveilled by 13 cameras with the ability to review video records for ten days. Students have access to a basketball court and a set of pull-up bars. Students can access a green house and garden area for horticultural programming.

The AUHSD maintenance and custodial staff maintain the buildings and grounds. The district budgets for major repair or replacement of existing school building components, and this includes roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting, and floor systems. Maintenance is currently looking at the status of the roofing and has also invested time and money in the heating and air conditioning units.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The 2020-21 data cells have N/A values because these data are not comparable to other year data due to the COVID-19 pandemic during the 2020-21 school year. Where the CAASPP assessments in ELA and/or mathematics is not the most viable option, the LEAs were allowed to administer local assessments. Therefore, the 2020-21 data between school years for the school, district, state are not an accurate comparison. As such, it is inappropriate to compare results of the 2020-21 school year to other school years.

Orientation meetings include overall academic and behavioral expectations, and description of the various pathways for student graduation available at North Valley High School. Frequent communication with assigned counselors and administration includes goal setting, updates to student transcripts and credit needs , and review of graduation requirements. Other opportunities for Parental Involvement include IEP and/or 504 status, meetings to address homeless/unaccompanied youth status, and/or foster placement. All Individualized Education Plan (IEP) meetings include participation by parent, teacher, and/or other necessary individuals. Another opportunity for parental involvement includes site council and voluntary opportunities, as well as involvement in review and creation of Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) accreditation. Parents are given an annual survey to assess the areas of strength and improvement.

Professional Development

The primary areas of focus for staff development are credit recovery, remediation, and interim testing. Student performance and credit achievement data is used to determine professional development needs. Professional development is delivered in after school workshops, trainings on collaboration days, conference attendance (virtually), and individual mentoring. Teachers are supported during implementation through in-class coaching, teacher-principal meetings, staff meeting to monitor student progress, and student performance data reporting. The District offers three district wide in-service days for all staff in addition to numerous Collaboration days for departments and individuals to receive professional development. Our current focus for professional development includes PBIS, Restorative Justice, and Emotional Regulation. Additional training has been administered in Edgenuity, CAASP, ELPAC, and general educational products.
